Interim Dean, 2019-2021

School of Social Work, The University of Alabama

As Interim Dean of the School of Social Work, I lead the school in its mission to provide "community-engaged research in health, behavioral health, and social and economic justice solutions" for the state and the nation.

Responsibilities

Primary duties as Interim Dean included:

• Maintaining the national reputation and visibility of a top-50 ranked School of Social Work.

- Being responsible for 37 full-time faculty and 60+ staff members.
- Supervising three associate deans, five program directors, a fiscal manager, a registrar, a development officer, and a grant and contract specialist, among other professional staff.
- Managing an operating budget of over six million dollars.
- Overseeing five million dollars in total endowments.
- Supporting a well-established research program (third highest external award total of all UA colleges and schools in FY 2020).
- Providing program oversight for four degree programs, three of which include primarily online degrees in addition to campus-based degrees.
- Sustaining relationships with community members, alumni, and prospective donors.

Selected Accomplishments and Initiatives

I served as interim dean for two and a half years, which provided me ample opportunity to interface with all aspects of the operations of the School of Social Work.

- Successfully led the School through its national reaccreditation.
- Collaborated with the School's Director of Development to meet the School's initial capital campaign goal. With that success, the School's goal was increased and we raised 86% of the revised campaign goal during my tenure at Dean.
- Created the position and appointed the School's first Chief Diversity Officer.
- Worked in collaboration with faculty and staff to develop the School's first bylaws.
- Supervised the first revision of the School's retention, tenure, and promotion guidelines since 1989.
- Implemented a staff and administrator professional and leadership development program.
- Worked collaboratively with an external consultant to improve morale of the faculty and staff.
- Restructured school-wide faculty and staff meetings to ensure greater efficiency while at the same time enhancing faculty and staff involvement in School leadership.
- Aligned schedule development and fiscal affairs to maximize revenues from distance learning programs.
- Oversaw the establishment of research policies on internal grant and contract routing, course buyout rates, and indirect cost recovery faculty share.
- Oversaw the establishment of administrative policies on academic continuity, external compensation (in advance of a university-wide policy), professional communications expectations, and implemented a workplace attire policy (at the request of staff).
- Supervised the deployment to two new distance education programs.
- Worked in collaboration with the School's Title IV-E Coordinator to establish social work simulation labs.
- Assisted the School's Director of Field Education to establish a partnership with the Office of Student Care and Well-Being to provide case management to students during the pandemic.

Chairperson, 2014-2021

Department of Criminology & Criminal Justice, The University of Alabama

As Chair of the Department of Criminology & Criminal Justice, I provided overall leadership and administrative management of the unit in working toward achieving its goals of "developing and disseminating knowledge about crime, criminal justice, deviance, and social organization through research, teaching, and service." While serving as Interim Dean of the School of Social Work, I technically remained Chair of the Department of Criminology & Criminal Justice, working in close collaboration with an Associate Chair who managed the day-to-day operations of the Department.

Responsibilities

Primary duties as Department Chairperson included:

• Supervising over 20 full-time faculty and 2 full-time staff members.

- Program oversight for 1,029 undergraduate majors, 854 undergraduate minors, and 36 Master's students in a unit that produced approximately 30,000 credit hours annually.
- Managing an overall budget of over \$600,000, which includes all aspects of the Department except tenure-line faculty and staff salaries.
- Conducting annual merit reviews for all faculty and making raise recommendations to the Dean of the College of Arts and Sciences.
- Conducting annual retention reviews of probationary faculty.
- Mentoring junior faculty to tenure/promotion to associate professor and associate professors to promotion to full professor.
- Supervising recruitment of all new faculty.
- Scheduling all classes and monitoring enrollment trends.
- Completing annual assessment of the Department's degree programs.
- Developing and maintaining relationships with community members, alumni, and prospective donors.

Selected Accomplishments and Initiatives

All of the following represent the collective efforts of myself and the faculty/staff in the Department of Criminology & Criminal Justice under my leadership.

- Led the Department through its first Academic Program Review in 11 years. Generated an action plan with 23 recommendations of which all were addressed in four years.
- Grew the department budget by over 25% through managing online course enrollment in the core curriculum, the addition of a new online degree program, and restructuring the rank of faculty teaching high enrollment courses to maximize course fees. Also, reorganized the departmental budgeting process to better forecast course fees and online course revenues.
- Oversaw the growth of external awards to over \$1,250,000 in AY2020.
- Increased undergraduate majors by 38% in five years by offering more seats in core curriculum classes, streamlining the major curriculum, diversifying upper-level course offerings, and strategically staffing introductory-level courses with highly-rated instructors. Through similar strategies, increased undergraduate minor count by 236% over the same time period.
- Developed and deployed the first fully online, traditional major in the College of Arts and Sciences.
- Increased total credit hour production by 42% in five years.
- Established an Executive Committee made up of elected members of each rank of the faculty who serve in an advisory capacity to the Chair.
- Drafted and implemented the Department's first ever bylaws.
- Revised the Department's Tenure and Promotion Guidelines.
- Created rubrics to clarify and make transparent the expectations for faculty annual merit reviews.
- Implemented written procedures for the equitable assignment and rotation of classes.
- Started a faculty mentoring program, pairing junior and senior faculty.
- Instituted an annual review of part-time instructors that includes class observations, SOI evaluations, and syllabi review by the Undergraduate Committee.
- Created a Director of Instruction position to support the professional development of all faculty, but especially part-time instructors.
- Comprehensively restructured the undergraduate curriculum to streamline the requirements and be more consistent with our aspirational peers.
- Fully redesigned assessment in both our undergraduate and graduate programs to ensure that they meaningfully capture the goals of the programs.
- Established an annual speaker event to bring nationally renowned criminologists to campus.

As Director of Graduate Studies, I supervised all aspects of the graduate program in sociology. I served as the liaison between the Department and the Graduate School and worked collaboratively with the Department Chair to ensure the continued vitality of a large doctoral program.
