Faculty Publications and Achievements

Dr. Ariane Prohaska published "'Still Struggling': Intersectionality, Vulnerability, and Long-Term Recovery After the Tuscaloosa, Alabama USA Tornado" in the journal *Critical Policy Studies*.

Dr. Jihoon Kim published "Gender Differences in Link between Cyberbullying and Parental Supervision and Trajectories" in *Crime & Delinquency*, 66(13-14), 1914-1936.

Dr. Susan Dewey's latest book, *Third Sector Organizations in Sex Work and Prostitution: Contested Engagements in Africa, the Americas, and Europe* is co-authored with Dr. Chimaraoke Izugbara (International Center for Research on Women, Washington D.C.) and Dr. Isabel Crowhurst (University of Essex, U.K.) and forthcoming with Routledge in 2021. Summary results of her study of correctional education programs in seven state prison systems and the Washington, D.C. jails recently appeared in the *Journal of Correctional Education*, with five additional articles on specific aspects of the study results targeted for journal submission by the end of the academic year.

Dr. Adam Lankford published journal articles in *Criminology & Public Policy* and *Econ Journal Watch* that analyze public mass shooters, why their attacks have become more deadly over time in the United States, and how the frequency of their attacks in America compares to the frequency of public mass shootings in other countries.

Dr. Daisy Muibu recently received the extramural 2020 Association for the Study of the Middle East and Africa research grant for her work on police legitimacy, community policing, and counterterrorism in regions of protracted conflict.

Dr. Diana Dolliver was funded by the Department of Homeland Security and the Criminal Investigations and Network Analysis (CINA) Center to study digital forensic artifacts related to cryptocurrency wallet applications installed on iPhones.
